WHAT IS TRIO?

TRIO is a set of federally-funded college opportunity programs that motivate and support students from disadvantaged backgrounds in their pursuit of a college degree. The TRIO programs were the first national college access and retention programs to address the serious social and cultural barriers to education in America. TRIO began as part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's War on Poverty.

WHO IS SERVED?

As mandated by Congress, two-thirds of the students served must come from families with incomes at 150% or less of the federal poverty level and in which neither parent graduated from college. More than 2,800 TRIO projects currently serve approximately 810,000 students and veterans, including nearly 34,000 students in the state of Illinois.

TALENT SEARCH

Population Served: Students in grades 6-12 and adults up to age 27 pursuing post-secondary education who qualify as low-income or potential first-generation college students.

Services Offered: Academic, financial, career, or personal counseling including advice on entry or re-entry to secondary or postsecondary programs; career exploration and aptitude assessment; tutorial services; information on postsecondary education; exposure to college campuses; mentoring programs; assistance in completing college admissions and financial aid applications; assistance in preparing for college entrance exams; information on student financial assistance; special activities for sixth, seventh, and eighth graders; workshops for the families of participants.



UPWARD BOUND

Upward Bound is an intensive intervention program that prepares students for higher education through various enrichment courses. The program provides opportunities for participants to succeed in their precollege performance and ultimately in their higher education pursuits.

Population Served: Students in grades 9-12 who qualify as low-income or potentially first-generation college students.

Services Offered: Academic year weekly services and a six-week summer program. Services include academic instruction in math, science, composition, literature, and foreign language, tutoring and mentoring, academic, financial, and personal counseling, assistance completing college & financial aid applications, and career exploration.

VETERANS UPWARD BOUND

Veterans Upward Bound is designed to motivate and assist veterans in the development of academic and other requisite skills necessary for acceptance and success in a program of postsecondary education.

Population Served: Veterans who meet military service requirements stipulated in the authorizing statute and who are low-income, prospective first-generation college students preparing to enter a postsecondary institution

Services Offered: Intensive basic skills development for GED completion, refresher classes for subjects required in college, academic, financial, and personal counseling, tutoring services, and assistance completing college and financial aid applications.

Projects are also expected to assist veterans in securing support services from other locally available resources such as the Veterans Administration, state veterans agencies, veteran associations, and other state and local services.

UPWARD BOUND MATH/SCIENCE

Upward Bound Math-Science provides students with a rigorous math and science curriculum in high school to encourage and enable them to successfully major in critically important science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) disciplines in college.

Population Served: Students in grades 9-12 who qualify as low-income or potential first-generation college students who have an interest in pursuing careers in STEM.

Services Offered: Summer programs consist of intensive math and science training, year-round counseling and advising, computer training, exposure to university faculty who perform research in math and science, scientific research conducted under the guidance of a faculty or graduate student mentor. Tutoring and mentoring, academic, financial, and personal counseling, assistance completing college and financial aid applications, and career exploration.



EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY CENTERS

Educational Opportunity Centers located throughout the country primarily serve displaced or underemployed workers from families. These Centers help individuals to choose a college and a suitable financial aid program.

Population Served: Adults 19 years or older pursuing postsecondary education as first-generation and low-income students.

Services Offered: Academic advising, personal counseling, career workshops, college application assistance & test reparation, and financial & economic literacy education.

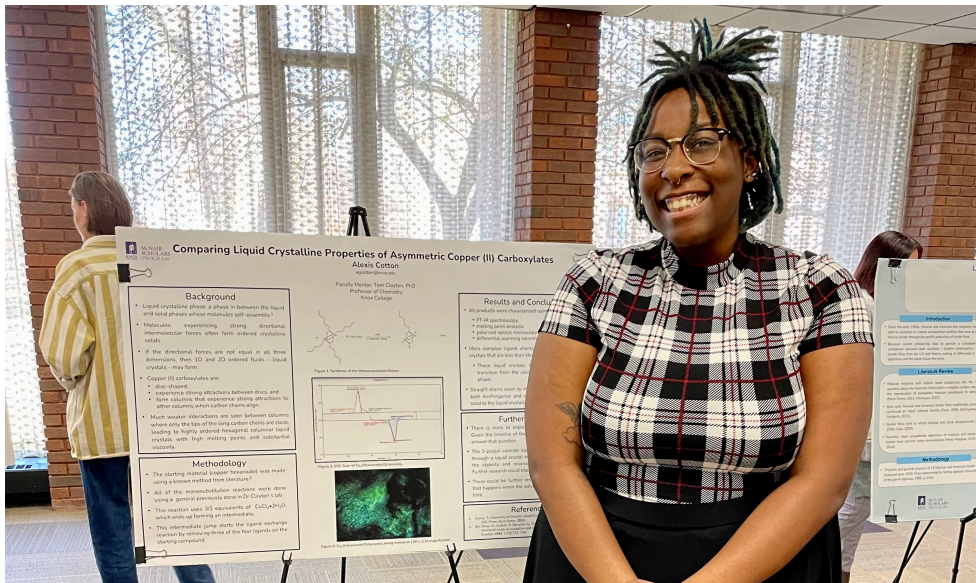
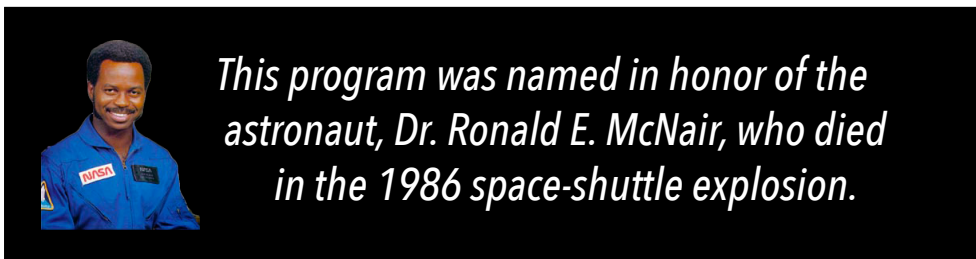


MCNAIR

The Ronald E. McNair Postbaccalaureate Achievement program is designed to encourage low-income students and minority undergraduates to consider careers in college teaching as well as prepare for doctoral study. Students who participate in this program are provided with research opportunities and faculty mentors.

Population Served: Undergraduate students who qualify as low-income, first-generation, and/or underrepresented populations in their field of interest who wish to pursue graduate education.

Services Offered: Opportunities for mentorship & scholarly activities, summer research internship, seminars & workshops to prepare students for graduate study, and assistance with graduate school admissions processes.
